
## **Day Seventeen | Roger's Travelers Notebook**



Seventeen Days across the much of the United States of America. Our little RAV4 did its job comfortably, efficiently, and reliably transporting us to each destination.


We drove **3,931.4 miles** at an average speed of 58 MPH. Our average fuel efficiency was 31.4 miles per gallon. We refueled our tank nine times, using about 125 gallons of gasoline.

The average gas price was \$3.50 per gallon, but it was lower in most parts of the country. It was around \$2.99 and even as low as \$2.69. However, in California, the cost was much higher for two fill-ups at the start and end of our trip. See **Day Two**, when, in the Mojave desert, I paid \$8.55 per gallon! This affected the overall average. I might have made a mistake with the math, but that's the basic idea.

We traveled through seven states: California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, and Arkansas, taking our time and driving only around 300 miles per day.

America is currently experiencing a highly significant election. While every Presidential election holds importance, this one stands out above all others in our lifetime.


